Glen Gordon, Dean of the U.Mass College of Social and Behavioral Studies, was instrumental in the formation of PERI and in planning the new building. David Gordon's theoretical, political and organizational work in the area of political economy is honored each year through the David Gordon Lecture at the URPE Summer Conference. David was an active member of URPE until his death in 1996.

URPE AT ASSA BORDER TOUR SAN DIEGO, CA, 2004 Friday, January 2

The Review of Radical Political Economics is sponsoring a tour of the Mexico/United States border area on January 2, 2004. A Sundance Stage Lines bus will pick up participants at the Manchester Grand Hyatt Hotel (the URPE hotel) in San Diego at 1 p.m. (The bus has a restroom and cold water will be provided.) Our tour leader will be Victor Clark, a Mexican citizen, and the founder and director of the Binational Committee for Human Rights (BCHR), an NGO based in Tijuana. BCHR focuses on indigenous and migrant rights, but includes all marginalized groups in Tijuana.

The tour will include an industrial park where there are maquilas, the Cultural Center, Mercado Hidalgo, Ave. Revolucion, Playas de Tijuana, among other sites. We will enter Mexico at Otay Mesa and exit via San Ysidro. (Please bring your passports.)

The plan is to return to the Manchester Grand Hyatt at around 4 p.m. Space has been arranged in rooms Randle A & B to have a post-tour discussion. Several experts on the border will help us understand what the human and political issues are. They will include editorial board members David Barkin and Tamar Diana Wilson, and Roberto Martinez, former director of the San Diego American Friends Service Committee. The discussion will go on until 6 p.m. Following the discussion, those who wish to can take taxis to the Casa de Bandini restaurant in the Old Town San Diego State Historic Park. (Taxis will cost about \$20; if 5 share it would be \$8 round trip per person.)

REPORT FROM THE URPE STEERING COMMITTEE

The 2003 Summer Conference was very successful, both in terms of content and in numbers. The focus of the conference, War and Empire, was a timely one, and the plenary speakers provided substantive perspectives on a wide range of issues. The workshops were also valuable. Attendance was also considerably higher than in previous years., and a large proportion of people stayed for the Tuesday morning events.

Next year's 2004 Summer Conference will take place earlier in the year, from Friday June 4 to Monday June 7. It will take place, as before, at Camp Chinqueka in Bantam Connecticut, but the camp has its own special event planned for our usual time slot. One advantage of this earlier time slot is that the conference can begin on mid-day Friday, rather than Saturday, which will, we hope, be more convenient for many people. Planning for the conference will be a major topic on the Steering Committee's November meeting, and we hope to have information on the plenaries and possible workshops in the January Newsletter. NEW ON THE URPE WEBSITE - CHECK IT OUT!

The website plans we wrote about in the Summer Newsletter are taking shape. We have begun to build a resource site on our website for teaching heterodox economics. We have begun with three sections, and hope to add a fourth sometime this winter. We have: 1) Syllabi, 2) Texts, and Supplementary Books and Materials, and 3) Heterodox Journals. The fourth section will be the Hypertext Project that we discussed at our summer workshop/retreat (more on that in the next Newsletter).

The names of the three sections pretty well indicate their content. Under syllabi, we are collecting syllabi that URPE people use to teach heterodox courses. Twenty five years ago we had a hard copy of such a list, and it was a great aid to people looking to start, or enrich, some heterodox class at their school. So far, we have about 10 syllabi, so we have just begun. Please send us a copy of anything non mainstream that you teach, and we will post it for everyone to benefit from. The third section is a list of about forty heterodox journals, that you can look at to find articles of interest for your classes (and also should know about as places that might publish your heterodox research). For a hard copy version of this list see pp. 12-20 of this Newsletter. If you need refer to them in the future, they will be on our web site. Finally, the section Texts, Supplementary Books and Materials has also only been started. There are a handful of books that might be of interest, but there are also connections to thirteen groups that put out hundreds of papers and fact sheets on issues of economic justice, that vary from quite academic to more undergraduate/popular, that you may find useful for various classes at all different levels.

The growth of this section depends on the members of URPE. Please check them out, and then send to me books you use as texts in heterodox courses, supplementary books, and other groups that put out papers that could be used in our courses. Please send all such information to al.campbell@economics.utah.edu. We believe that with broad input this can become a tremendously valuable resource for people trying to put together, or get new ideas for, a heterodox course.

In addition, the section on jobs for heterodox economists is regularly updated over the fall, as is the section on heterodox conferences and calls for papers.

Cornell also has the URPE/RRPE archives, so this is the perfect place to have a complete collection of historical materials.

REVIEW OF THE REVIEW

The transition from Elsevier Science to Sage Publications is now complete. As in every other transition between publishers, there were problems. The difference here was that Sage responded promptly and professionally, which went a long way toward smoothing the speed bumps. The managing editor now manages the journal's accounts, thus simplifying paperwork. Financially, the Sage contract puts us in the best shape we have ever been in. Financial security allows us to think of our broader mission.

In 2002 we had 48 full-length articles submitted, with a 27% acceptance rate; 44% were foreign submissions. We had 38 book reviews submitted with a 76% acceptance rate; 32% were foreign submissions. In the works are special issues on The Political Economy of Art, The Regulation of Global Capitalism, The History of Radical Economics, and the Radical Political Economy of Consumption. Our paper flow provides a queue of material for 12 to 18 months, but this can only be sustained with continued submissions.

I am especially pleased with the new system of maintaining the subscriber list. Centralizing the list with the managing editor has drastically cut non-fulfillment complaints. Also, moving editorial board elections to a paper ballot has allowed members who do not attend the summer conference to more fully participate in the election process. You have responded with vigor to this expanded democratic opportunity. (See election results in separate section.)

We are investigating the possibility of producing a digitized version of the RRPE from volume 1 number 1 through volume 34 number 4. The ability to accurately scan formulas has made this effort feasible. It is an expensive undertaking, but one that would make all issues available to researchers. Whether this would be an e-commerce initiative is still to be determined. Stay tuned.

The Review is sponsoring a tour of the California/Mexico border area the day before the San Diego ASSA meetings, on January 2. Following the tour, there will be a panel discussion (open to all). URPE members and friends are invited to join us for dinner at Casa de Bandini. (See page 3 of this Newsletter.) This should be a fun and informative event. We plan on organizing events at future ASSA meetings; be thinking about what would be of interest to URPE members in Philadelphia.

UPDATE ON ECONOMY CONNECTION (URPE'S RESOURCE/SPEAKERS BUREAU)

Are you still in the dark about why, on August 14, you had to read the *RRPE* by candle light, and eat up all the ice cream in your freezer before it melted? EC members Tyson Slocum, research director of Public Citizen's energy program, and Nomi Prins, former investment banker and author of the forthcoming *Money for Nothing*, provided some answers Sept. 9 on WBAI's *Ecologic*, hosted by Ken Gale. They were also joined by Suzanne Smith, director of Standard and Poor's infrastructure rating services. Tyson began with the sequence of events in the August blackout: an Ohio power plant owned by First Energy Corp. went out, and First Energy compensated by drawing power from distant states over poorly maintained transmission lines that could not handle the increased load, starting a chain reaction. Tyson placed most of the blame for the blackout on the 1990's deregulation of the energy industry. Under the regulated system, power companies operated in smaller geographical areas and were legally obligated to maintain their transmission lines. But in deregulating electricity, Congress chose a system in which "power plants provide power not to where it's most needed, but to whoever is willing to pay the highest price." Electricity is now travelling far greater distances over lines that are in disrepair. Tyson noted that in every area of the US where deregulation has been implemented it has led to less government oversight and huge rate increases, the largest of which was California's 1000% increase.

Nomi pointed out that deregulation has hurt the electricity industry as well as consumers. Triple A credit ratings for utilities are a thing of the past. And those transmission lines that contributed so heavily to the blackout were not neglected due to lack of cash -- utilities have borrowed over a trillion dollars since the late 90's. But they used that money to speculate in other industries, especially telecoms, and when the telecoms crashed the ratepayers were left holding the bag. Some are suing. "It was not an industry that lacked capital; it was an industry that lacked appropriate rules as to how to use that capital to create a stable grid."

EC member David Kotz was George Reiter's guest on *Thresholds*, a program on another Pacifica radio station, KPFT in Houston. The topic was socialism. David spoke about the inability of capitalism to provide basic necessities to all of the people in the US, and about the experience of socialism in the USSR. David said that the common view that the planned economy of the USSR didn't work is false. While the Soviet Economy had many problems, it functioned and grew, and also achieved some

social progress, through the mid 70's. David felt this was important to note in light of recent attempts to rewrite history, omitting any gains by government-run institutions, both in the USSR and in the US. David also suggested that a democratically-run socialist system would work far better than the authoritarian system run by a small elite in the former USSR.

Jack Hammond spoke to students in Herb Michael's Bronx high school class, where Paddy Quick had spoken earlier. Jack reports that "the class had seen *Life and Debt* and the topic was migration so I talked about two things: first, the wars of Central America of the 80s and early 90s, then the debt crisis and economic stagnation as reflected in Jamaica and how each of these generated migration." Jack commented that the group was small but lively, and had lots to say. Herb added that the students were able to make use of the talk in their final papers.

Jack also invited Barbara Garson to speak to his sociology students at Hunter College; they had been reading Barbara's book *All the Livelong Day* (1975), in which people describe their routine jobs in auto plants, tuna canneries, insurance offices, etc. "I introduced my talk by explaining the difference between the 1970's when everyone had jobs and felt it almost a moral fault if they stuck with tedious work and today when holding onto a job no matter how bad, is something to be proud of. The students seemed interested in the way things had changed." Barbara also talked about Taylorism, and in the discussion period students described some of their own less-than-perfect job experiences. Jack says, "Barbara was great."

When you are giving a talk to non-economists, do you critique capitalism as a system? To address some of the obstacles you might face (including what to say, since URPE members don't agree about why capitalism is in crisis), EC sponsored a workshop called "Crisis Theory for Non-Economists" at the URPE Summer Conference. We had two purposes in mind: a substantive discussion, in accessible language, of several popular crisis theories; and also a discussion of actual speaking experiences. Max Fraad Wolff described elements of an economic crisis and gave a short historical overview; Mary Malloy focused on "Falling Rate of Profit" while integrating other theories; and I described the Monthly Review viewpoint. The workshop attracted primarily non-economists, who had lots of questions and opinions, and read with interest our handouts on corporate size and concentration, and inequality in wealth and income.

One possible approach is to couch the discussion in terms of a debate between liberal and conservative approaches, but such an approach must take into account the neoclassical/institutionalist dichotomy.

Call for Panels

The deadline for URPE panel suggestions is December 1.

Because of space limitations, the number of panels URPE can sponsor is limited. In recent years URPE has been co-sponsoring one or more panels with Dollars and Sense and sometimes other groups. URPE can have 2 panels of our own; if we co-sponsor, our name can be on 3 panels. And individuals can sometimes be placed on panels sponsored by other groups. Each panel pays \$100 to the SSC to help cover conference costs. Usually this fee has been raised by dividing the cost of the panel among the panelists and chair (usually 3-5 people); once this panel fee is paid, however, all members of the panel are entitled to attend the entire conference without paying individual registration fees.

People who attend the SSC are well-informed but most are not economists. Panels should be on topics of general interest. Please be prepared to make a major contribution toward organizing your panel, but be open to the possibility of accepting additional suggestions of panelists from URPE or SSC.

The factors involved in determining which panels will be sponsored by URPE include: how many panels apply; whether your panel is of general interest; whether a panel on the same topic has already been accepted by the SSC; whether URPE decides to co-sponsor panels with other organizations; how much effort you are able to contribute toward organizing your panel; whether it is possible to form a complete panel from your suggestion; and whether you have been in an URPE SSC panel recently. The organizers of the SSC work closely with panel organizers, and may have some voice in which panels are accepted. They also may be able to find you a place on another panel.

What economic policies should the challengers to George W. Bush stake out in their battle for the Presidency?

In addition to the above topics, AFIT welcomes papers reflecting the tradition and analytical perspective of Institutional Economics. Submissions from economists of other heterodox schools of thought, including ecological, feminist, Marxist, post Keynesian, and social economics, are also welcome. We also encourage proposals from graduate students, and it is anticipated that at least one and possibly more panels of graduate student papers will be included in the program this year.
